The Township of Nipissing enrolled in Stewardship Ontario's Blue Box reporting system starting in 2011 and as a result has received a total of \$4,613.06 from the Industry funding for Municipal Blue Box Recycling for the 2013 Program Year. The funding amounts are based on the amount of recycled materials diverted from our landfills. These payments are based on the 2011 figures.



### ONTARIO ELECTRONIC STEWARDSHIP

The Township of Nipissing has been working in partnership with the OES since 2012 to help keep harmful electronic co mponents out of our Landfills.

OES has collected a total of 4 bins from the Township since the installation of the program, resulting in a total of \$1,771.50 revenue for the Landfills with no additional costs to our Residents.


#### FITNESS CENTRE UPDATE:



- Proposed changes to Speed Limits
- Fire Department requirements and concerns regarding Private Roads and Entranceways

Information on these topics will be available at the Open House session beginning at 6:30 pm. Council and Staff will be available to discuss concerns, questions and provide background on these items.

A Town Hall Meeting will follow beginning at 7:30 pm to allow Residents an opportunity to hear Council's reasoning for proposed changes and begin a discussion to address concerns and questions.



Many municipalities in Ontario use Design Criteria issued by the Ministry of Transportation, Directive – 16, on October 30, 1985 for road maintenance. Road improvements had to meet these standards to be eligible for subsidies from the Ministry. The funding program no longer exists.

Meeting the subject specifications is a difficult level to achieve when existing roadways in many instances are "forced roads" constructed according to existing topography and without design by an engineer.

Most members of the public assume that the statutory speed limit in rural areas is 80 km/hr.

Allowing the greater speed limit on roads without proper engineering studies could expose the municipality to increased liability.

For safety reasons, Council may have to lower the speed limit on certain roads to shift some of the liability from the municipality to the driver.



## **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS**



#### **Winter Storms**

Winter storms can be treacherous and damaging if you are unprepared. They can disrupt power supply, transportation routes, and create personal safety issues. Bitter cold and winter storms kill more people than the number of Canadians killed by tornadoes, thunderstorms, lightning, floods and hurricanes combined. When building your family emergency plan, review and discuss these safety tips with your entire household to make sure everyone understands what to do.

#### **General Tips**

- -Listen to the radio and/or television for weather reports and emergency information. Stay indoors. If you must go outside, dress for the weather to avoid serious cold-related injuries.
- -Avoid overexertion when shoveling snow. If you must shovel snow, ensure you take frequent breaks so as not to over stress your body.
- -Dress in several layers of lightweight clothing. Wear mittens and a hat (preferably one that covers your ears).
- -Wear waterproof, insulated boots to keep your feet warm and dry and to maintain your footing in ice and snow.
- -Regularly check for frostbite. Indicators include numbness or white areas on your face and extremities (ear, nose, cheeks, hands and feet in particular).

#### **Prepare Now**

- -Review/discuss safety tips with your entire household to make sure everyone understands what to do during a severe winter storm.
- -Add additional items to your emergency survival kit such as; extra warm clothes or blankets.
- -Winterize your home to retain heat by insulating walls and attics, caulking or weather stripping doors and windows, and covering windows with plastic.
- -Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected once a year.

In the event of a declared emergency, a Registration Centre will be opened at an appropriate, safe location (I.E. Township Office or Community Centre). This will allow officials to confirm your safety prior to you leaving the area. Please register at these centres before you leave the area so that we can pass along your information to friends/family inquiring about your well-being.

#### Nipissing Fire Department Urges Residents to Prevent Kitchen Fires

The best way to prevent kitchen fires is to never leave cooking unattended, says Rob Serson, Fire Chief. The Chief's advice comes as part of Fire Prevention Week that was October 6-12 and the theme this year is "Prevent Kitchen Fires". Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home fires and injuries in the province.

"Often when we're called to a fire that started in the kitchen, the residents tell us that they only left the kitchen for a few minutes." said Rob Serson. "Sadly, that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. Help keep our community safe by taking responsibility to prevent fires from starting in the first place."

Important steps to prevent kitchen fires include:

- Pay attention when cooking especially if you are using oil or high temperatures. If you must leave for any reason, turn off the stove.
- Wear tight-fitting or rolled up sleeves when using the stove. Loose, dangling clothing can easily catch fire.
- Keep a proper fitting lid near the stove. If a pot catches fire, slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove.
- Never attempt to move a burning pot.
- Keep a close eye on anyone in your household who is drinking and attempts to cook.

The Nipissing Fire Department will be raising public awareness about fire safety and the importance of preventing kitchen fires.

#### **FIRE PERMITS**

Please remember that Fire Permits are required throughout the year. Daytime burning restrictions are in effect from April 1 to October 31. Fire Permits are available at no cost and are issued for 7 days.
