
# Where do your tax dollars go?



# TOWNSHIP OF NIPISSING FIRE DEPARTMENT

There may be an intruder lurking in your home from which no burglar alarm can protect you. <u>Carbon</u> <u>monoxide</u> is invisible and odourless and it can kill you.

The fire service recommends that you have your chimney, furnace and gas-fired appliances checked annually by professional technicians. Remember, only a carbon monoxide alarm can alert you to the presence of this deadly gas.



Facts to Remember:

- Carbon Monoxide (CO) is produced when fuels such as propane, gasoline, natural gas, heating oil or wood have insufficient air to burn completely. This can occur in any appliance or device that burns these fuels such as furnaces, fireplaces, hot water heaters or stoves.
- Other common causes of CO are cars left running in attached garages; barbecues operated inside; kerosene heaters that are improperly vented; or chimneys or vents that are dirty or plugged.
- Prevent CO build-up by having furnaces and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year.
- Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea and dizziness, as well as confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness and death.
- Installing a CO alarm in the home will alert occupants to the presence of this deadly gas. If only one alarm is being installed, locate it near sleeping areas. Additional alarms should be located in or adjacent to rooms with fuel-burning appliances.
- If someone in the household is experiencing symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Call 911 from outside the home.

## WINTER EMERGENCY PLANNING

Having a storm readiness plan in place saves valuable time if severe weather strikes. It is also important to maintain an emergency pack with a battery-powered flashlight, a radio, tools for emergency repair, ready-to-eat food, a first aid kit, blankets, and extra clothing. Keep your car gas tank full in case gas stations close down after a storm, and have some cash on hand in case bank machines and electronic payment methods are down.

When a warning is issued, stay calm and follow your plan. In winter, be sure to stock up on heating fuel. A great way to be aware of potential impending winter storms and be prepared, is


# <u>Trans Canada Trail</u>

The Trans Canada Trail Foundation is motivated to complete a national trail system by the year 2017 in conjunction with Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. This objective has helped make funds become available for trail building projects.

Changes have occurred to the Trans Canada Trail Foundation's core principles since the last attempt to create the link through the Township of Nipissing. The Foundation now allows roads suitable for bicycles to be designated as Trans Canada Trail. Directional signage is the only element required for "Roadway Trails".

The Nipissing Eco-Committee has been working with Discovery Routes on trail planning. Upon completion of a trail plan, trail development funds may be available from the Foundation. Discovery Routes Trails organisation can then work with the Township to raise any matching funds required to complete the trail system through the Township of Nipissing.

At this time, the Council of the Township of Nipissing would like feedback from Nipissing residents regarding a proposal to complete the connection of the Trans Canada through the Township of Nipissing as seen on the map below.

plowing or shoveling snow onto or across municipal roads is prohibited under the Ontario Traffic Act. By doing this, ditches are filled in and are unable to function properly leading to washouts in the spring and icy roads in the winter

Please continue to take empty propane cylinders (all sizes) and compact fluorescent bulbs to the Household Hazardous Waste facility in North Bay. These items CANNOT BE PLACED IN THE LANDFILL.

### **CLEAR GARBAGE BAGS**

Please remember that only clear bags are permitted at the Landfills. Black garbage bags will be refused.

### 2014 LANDFILL ENTRY PERMITS

The 2014 Landfill Entry Permits are included in the Interim Tax Bill. Please have this permit each time you visit the landfill.
