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Please be advised that at its meeting held on May 11, 2026, Council of the Township of Clearview passed the following resolution regarding Public Sector Salary Disclosure Inflation Adjustments:

Moved by Councillor McArthur, Seconded by Councillor Broderick, Whereas the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act passed in 1996, requires that every public employer make available for inspection by the public without charge, a written record of the amount of salary and benefits paid in the previous year by the employer to or in respect of an employee to whom the employer paid at least \$100,000 as a salary; and,

Whereas this \$100,000 salary threshold has not been updated since 1996, to reflect inflation; and,

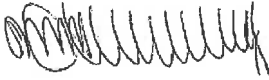
Whereas with consumer price index (CPI) adjustments, \$100,000 is equivalent to just over \$180,000 today;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that Council of the Township of Clearview request that the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act be amended to reflect the impact of inflation on the \$100,000 salary threshold for reporting, by either adding wording to reflect annual adjustments related to the consumer price index (CPI) or providing an adjusted salary of \$200,000; and,

That this resolution be sent to the Hon. Doug Ford, Premier; Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing; Simcoe-Grey MPP Brian Saunderson; the Association of Municipalities and all Ontario Municipalities. Motion Carried.

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### Background:

The Township of Nipissing issued a Statement for Pre-Qualification for the Bear Creek Bridge and Abutment Construction on April 17, 2026 closing on April 28<sup>th</sup>, 2026. The Township received 7 submissions and all 7 contractors met the pre-qualification requirements. The 7 contractors were invited to a mandatory site meeting on May 20<sup>th</sup>; 4 contractors were in attendance at the meeting.

On June 1, 2026 the Township issued an invitational tender NIP-PW-10-2026 for the Bear Creek Bridge and Abutment Construction to the 4 contractors in attendance at the meeting. The tender closed on June 11, 2026 and the Township received 2 bids.

### Summary:

The large variance between the 2 bids received has created concern for proper project completeness and the projects success. In reviewing the submissions with Antoine Boucher, Municipal Engineer the figures provided by one of the bidders is well beyond the scope of the project.

### Recommendation:

We respectfully request Council's permission to negotiate with each bidder to ensure adequate understanding of the project, ability to complete the bridge and abutment construction to our satisfaction and to the specifications of the bridge and abutment design.

**A. PROPOSAL/BACKGROUND**

A Zoning By-law Amendment application has been submitted for the subject properties located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road and 95 Hinchberger Bay Road. The Zoning By-law Amendment application has been submitted by Tulloch Engineering (c/o Steve McArthur) on behalf of the owners: Tim Morgan who owns the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road, and Samuel Bagyan and Cheryl Butler who own the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road. An aerial image showing the boundaries of the subject properties is included in Figure 1.

*Figure 1: Subject Lands*



The owners have applied for a Consent (lot addition) application concurrently which involves the addition of a small triangular parcel of land to be transferred from the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road to the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road. The small triangular parcel of land contains a portion of the existing driveway that provides access to the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road and the application will ensure that the driveway is solely located on the property. The lands to be added are shown on Figure 2.

Figure 2: Lands to be Added



The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment application is the following:

- 1) To rezone the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road from the Open Space (OS) Zone to the Shoreline Residential (SR) Zone to recognize the existing shoreline residential use; and,
- 2) To rezone the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road from the Shoreline Residential (SR) Zone to Special Zone No. 26 (SZ-26) Shoreline to recognize the reduced lot area following a concurrent lot addition application with the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road. This is required through a condition of provisionally Consent.

During the review of the Consent (lot addition) application, it was noted that the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road was located within the OS Zone which does not reflect the historic and existing use of the property (shoreline residential). The owners needed to submit a Zoning By-law Amendment regardless to recognize the reduced lot area of the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road following the lot addition, so it was recommended to the owners that the zoning at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road be cleaned up through this process as well.

Following the lot addition, the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road is decreasing in lot area by approximately 0.04 hectares or 4,000 square metres and the resulting lot area is approximately 0.48 hectares or 4,800 square metres, and this lot area does not meet the minimum requirement in the Zoning By-law for the SR Zone.

## **B. POLICY & REGULATORY REVIEW**

### **B1. Provincial Planning Statement**

All applications made under the *Planning Act*, must be consistent with the Provincial Planning Statement (PPS). The subject lands are considered Rural Lands in the context of the PPS. The existing shoreline residential uses on the subject properties are permitted in the context of the Official Plan.

Section 3 of the PPS contains policies that address natural and human-made hazards. There are no natural or human-made hazards identified on the subject properties.

Section 4 of the PPS includes policies regarding the long-term protection of Ontario's natural heritage features and areas. There are no natural heritage features and areas located on the subject properties that would have an impact on the application.

The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment application is consistent with the PPS.

### **B2. Township of Nipissing Official Plan**

The subject properties are designated as Shoreline on Schedule A of the Official Plan. Section 2.4.2 of the Official Plan permits residential uses in the Shoreline designation. The existing shoreline residential uses are permitted uses in the context of the Official Plan.

The current OS Zone on the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road does not accurately reflect the existing shoreline residential use that has historically been on the property. The rezoning to the SR Zone will recognize the existing use and ensure that the property is within the appropriate zone in the implementing Zoning By-law.

Following the proposed lot addition, the lot area of property located at 95 Hinchberger Road is decreasing. The lot addition does not result in any new development on the properties and there are no changes to the existing situation on either of the subject properties. The reduced lot area does not have an impact on the subject properties nor surrounding land uses. The subject properties are adequately sized to accommodate the existing development based on their historic uses.

There are no natural heritage features and areas located on the subject properties that would have an impact on the proposed application.

The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment application conforms to the Official Plan.

### B3. Township of Nipissing Zoning By-law 2020-20

The property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road is located within the Open Space (OS) Zone and the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road is located within the Shoreline Residential (SR) Zone in the Zoning By-law.

It was recommended that the zoning on the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road be corrected to reflect the existing use of a dwelling, and that this property be rezoned to the Shoreline Residential (SR) Zone. The SR Zone is appropriate based on the current and historic use of the property.

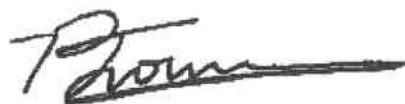
Following the proposed lot addition, the lot area of the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road is decreasing by approximately 4,000 square metres due to the lands to be added to the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road. The proposed lot area of the property at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road is approximately 4,800 square metres and the minimum lot area for the SR Zone is 0.8 hectares or 8,000 square metres. A Zoning By-law Amendment application is required to recognize the resulting lot area of 95 Hinchberger Bay Road because this existing lot is decreasing in lot area.

Despite the lot areas that do not meet the minimum requirement of the Zoning By-law, both subject properties contain existing development, including a dwelling and appropriate private services. There are no concerns with the slight adjustment to the lot areas between the properties as a result of the lot addition. It is recommended that a minimum lot area of 4,500 square metres be applied to the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road. This would provide some flexibility pending the final survey of the lot boundaries and lot area for the owner.

### C. RECOMMENDATION

Following the review of the Zoning By-law Amendment application, it is recommended that the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment to rezone the property located at 79 Hinchberger Bay Road to recognize the existing shoreline residential use and to recognize the reduction in lot area of the property located at 95 Hinchberger Bay Road be approved. The application is consistent with the PPS and conforms to the Official Plan. The application does not result in a new building lot or any new uses on the subject properties.

**Appointment Procedure for  
Filling Vacancy on Council**  
Approved by Council – June 4, 2024

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**General**

- The Clerk, or designate, shall be responsible for interpreting and, where appropriate, facilitating the appointment application process. The Clerk has the authority to make minor technical amendments to this procedure as may be required from time to time.
- Any individual filling the vacancy must be an Eligible Elector under the *Municipal Elections Act*.

**Appointment Procedure**

**Notice**

- An advertisement is placed on the Township of Nipissing website and on the Township notice board for two consecutive weeks after the vacancy occurs. The advertisement includes Council's intention to appoint a qualified person to fill the vacancy and the process to be followed. Communication using other methods may also be used where appropriate.

**Application**

- Any individual wishing to be considered for appointment to fill the Council vacancy will complete and sign the Council Vacancy Application form, Council Vacancy Declaration of Qualification form approved by the Clerk, and Council Vacancy Freedom of Information (FOI) Release, and will submit the forms to the Clerk in person by the date and time established by the Clerk.
- Individuals filing the above forms will be required to provide identification showing their name and a qualifying address to the satisfaction of the Clerk.
- Once submitted, the forms will be made available to the public in the same way as a nomination form for a candidate in a municipal election.
- Applicants may also submit a personal statement of qualification for consideration of Council. Personal statements will be typewritten in a 12-point (or greater) font on letter size (8 1/2" x 11") paper, shall not exceed one page in length and will include the applicant's name and address. Statements that do not meet these requirements will not be included in any Council meeting agenda or be provided to Council by the Clerk. The Clerk's office will advise applicants of the deadline for the submission of personal statements.
- It is the applicant(s) sole responsibility to meet any deadline or otherwise comply with any requirements of this procedure.
- The Clerk will create a list of all applicants, hereinafter referred to as candidates and publish once the deadline has passed and the candidates have been Certified.

## Council Meeting

- The list of candidates will be considered at an open Council meeting. The meeting may be a regular Council meeting or a special Council meeting called for that purpose.
- Notwithstanding the requirements of the Procedural By-law, the agenda for the meeting shall be set by the Clerk to allow for the orderly proceeding of selecting a candidate, while respecting the standard agenda of a regular Council meeting if applicable.
- Copies of all application documents will be included with the agenda package for the meeting and will be made available as part of the public agenda.
- Candidates will be invited to address Council for no more than five minutes each.
- The order of speaking will be determined by lot, where the first drawn will be afforded the opportunity to speak first and so on.
- Each member of Council will be permitted to pose a maximum of two questions to each candidate.
- Upon hearing all candidate submissions, Council will proceed to vote by way of a ballot vote.
- The Clerk shall tally all votes.
  1. If the candidate receiving the greatest number of votes cast does not receive more than one-half of the votes of all voting members of Council, candidates receiving zero votes will be automatically eliminated from the voting process and;
  2. The vote will be repeated for the remaining candidates.
  3. In the event of a duplicate result of the first voting tally, each remaining candidate will be asked to answer a pre-determined question by the Head of Council with a 3 minute time limit to answer.
  4. The vote will be repeated for the remaining candidates.
  5. In the event of a duplicate result to the previous two tallies, the Clerk shall place the names of the candidates with the least amount of votes into a draw and by drawing lot, select the name of one candidate to be removed from the process.
  6. The vote will be repeated for the remaining candidates.
  7. If this result does not produce a candidate with more than one-half of the votes, the steps in step 5. will be repeated.
  8. The vote will be repeated until a candidate with more than one-half of the votes is achieved.

If only two candidates remain, the tie shall be broken and the vacancy filled by the candidate selected by lot, as conducted by the Clerk, wherein the first name drawn shall be declared the successful candidate.

- Upon conclusion of the voting, the Clerk will declare to be elected the candidate receiving the votes of more than one-half of the number of voting Council members, or as provided in the event of a tie.
- A by-law confirming the appointment shall be enacted by Council to appoint the successful candidate to the office for the remainder of the term and the Clerk will administer the Oath of Office to the successful candidate at a time and date to be determined.
- The minutes of the Council meeting shall include a full disclosure of all voting results.

## Appointment Procedure for Filling Vacancy on Council

Appendix A to By-Law Number 2026-xx

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### Purpose

The purpose of this procedure is to provide the steps to be followed to ensure an open and transparent process when filling a Council vacancy by appointing an Eligible Elector.

### General

The Clerk, or designate, shall be responsible for interpreting and, where appropriate, facilitating the appointment application process.

Any individual filling the vacancy must be an Eligible Elector under the *Municipal Elections Act*.

Section 264 of the Municipal Act, 2001, provides that the person appointed or elected to fill a Vacancy shall hold the office for the remainder of the term of the person they replaced.

To be considered for Appointment, a Candidate must meet all the requirements to hold the Vacant office, and must not otherwise be disqualified from holding that office.

It is the Candidate's sole responsibility to meet any deadline or otherwise comply with any requirement established by the Council or the Clerk as part of the Appointment process.

In making its determination, Council will consider the costs and timelines associated with filling a Vacancy by appointment or by By-election.

### Definitions

- a) "**Act**" means the *Municipal Act*, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended.
- b) "**Appointment**" means the appointment of a qualified individual, by majority vote of Council, to fill a Vacancy on Council for the remainder of the current Council term.

- c) **"By-election"** means an election held to fill any Vacancy in accordance with the provisions of Section 65 of the *Municipal Elections Act, 1996*, as amended.
- d) **"Candidate"** means an individual seeking to be appointed to fill a Vacancy in the office of Councillor, having met the eligibility requirements and who has completed the requisite documentation as required by this procedure.
- e) **"Chair"** means the member of Council presiding at the Council meeting to appoint an individual to fill a Council Vacancy.
- f) **"Clerk"** means the Clerk or the designate of the Township of Nipissing as appointed by Council.
- g) **"Council"** means the Council of the Township of Nipissing.
- h) **"Eligible Elector"** has the same meaning as subsection 17(2) of the Municipal Elections Act, namely a person:
- a. Who is a resident of the Township of Nipissing, or an owner or tenant of the land in the Township or the spouse of such an owner or tenant;
  - b. Who is a Canadian Citizen;
  - c. Who is at least 18 years of age; and
  - d. Who is not prohibited from voting under any other Act or from holding municipal act.
- i) **"Lot"** means a method of determination by placing the names of the Candidates on equal size pieces of paper and placed in a container with one Candidate name being drawn by the Clerk.
- j) **"Majority"** means the largest number which is more than half of a total. For example; if there are four remaining Members of Council, then the majority would be 3 votes or if there are three remaining Members of Council, then the majority would be 2 votes.
- k) **"Municipality"** means The Corporation of the Township of Nipissing.
- l) **"Municipal Elections Act"** means the *Municipal Elections Act, S.O., 1996, c. 32*, as amended.

- m) **"Nominee"** means an individual seeking to fill a Vacancy on Council who meets the eligibility requirements and who has completed the requisite documentation as outlined in this procedure.
- n) **"Procedure By-Law"** means the By-Law adopted by Council for governing the proceedings of its Council, the conduct of its members and the calling of Meetings.
- o) **"Regular Election Year"** means the year established for a regular municipal election in accordance with the *Municipal Elections Act*.
- p) **"Term of Office"** means the period of time a Candidate is elected to hold office for which they are elected in accordance with the *Municipal Elections Act*.
- q) **"Township"** means The Corporation of the Township of Nipissing.
- r) **"Vacancy"** means when a seat on Council has become vacant in a manner described in Section 259 of the *Municipal Act*.

### **Legislative & Administrative Authorities**

If a Vacancy occurs in the office of a member of the Council, the Township shall, subject to this section,

Within 60 days after the day a declaration of Vacancy is made with respect to the Vacancy under Section 262 of the Act, the Township shall,

- a) Fill the Vacancy by appointing a person who has consented to accept the office if appointed; or
- b) Require a By-election to be held to fill the Vacancy in accordance with the *Municipal Elections Act, 1996*.

### **Appointment Procedure**

#### **Notice of Vacancy**

Following a Declaration of a Vacant Council seat by Council, the Clerk will prepare a post for circulation. Candidate packages will be prepared and made available from the Township Office and online.

The Clerk shall post a Council Vacancy Notice on the Municipal website, social media platforms, printed copies in the Township Office and other municipal facilities with public traffic for two (2) consecutive weeks. The notice shall indicate Council's intention to appoint an individual to fill a vacancy and shall outline the nomination process.

## **Mayor Vacancy**

If the Vacancy is in the office of the Mayor, Council may choose to fill the Vacancy by appointing a current member of Council who is a qualified individual as outlined in Section 256 of the Act.

The appointment of a current member of Council to fill the Vacancy on Council shall take place at a Special Meeting of Council called for such purposes, within 60 days of declaring a Vacancy.

Only a member of Council elected for the term in which the appointment is taking place shall be considered eligible for appointment.

At the Special Meeting of Council, the Chair may call for nominations from the floor. The Chair will request that any member of Council interested in being nominated shall indicate their interest by raising their hand. Anyone being considered for nomination must be present in Council Chambers.

Individuals seeking appointment to the position of Mayor who are current members of Council (nominees) shall declare a pecuniary interest.

Upon receipt of nomination, the Chair will ask if the nominee(s) accept the nomination. Nominations shall be confirmed by Resolution.

If there is only one nominee, the Clerk then shall declare and confirm the nominee to be appointed to the office of Mayor and a Resolution shall be passed.

If there are multiple nominees, then Council will debate the matter, vote by stating the Candidate's name, the nominee with the most votes will be declared successful and Council will pass a resolution to appoint the member to the vacant office.

If there is a tie, 2-1-1 or 1-1-1-1 vote, the steps explained below will be taken.

The successful Candidate shall formally be appointed by By-Law and complete the Oath of Office (required by subsection 232 of the Municipal Act and administered by the Clerk) immediately after the conclusion of the voting, and the new member shall take their Declaration of Office before taking their seat on Council.

## **Council Vacancy**

Any individual wishing to be considered for appointment to fill the Council vacancy will complete and sign the Council Vacancy Application form, Council Vacancy Declaration of Qualification form approved by the Clerk, and Council Vacancy Freedom of Information (FOI) Release, and will submit the forms to the Clerk in person by the date and time established by the Clerk.

Individuals filing the above forms will be required to provide identification showing their name and a qualifying address to the satisfaction of the Clerk.

Once submitted, the forms will be made available to the public in the same way as a nomination form for a candidate in a municipal election. They will be circulated to members of Council and copies will be placed on the Township website.

Applicants may also submit a personal statement of qualification for consideration of Council. Personal statements will be typewritten in a 12-point (or greater) font on letter size (8 1/2" x 11") paper, shall not exceed one page in length and will include the applicant's name and address.

Statements that do not meet these requirements will not be included in any Council meeting agenda or be provided to Council by the Clerk. The Clerk's office will advise applicants of the deadline for the submission of personal statements.

It is the applicant(s) sole responsibility to meet any deadline or otherwise comply with any requirements of this procedure.

The Clerk will create a list of all applicants, hereinafter referred to as candidates and publish once the submission deadline has passed and the candidates have been Certified.

### **Special Council Meeting**

The list of candidates will be considered at an open Council meeting. The meeting will be a special Council meeting called for that purpose.

Notwithstanding the requirements of the Procedural By-law, the agenda for the meeting shall be set by the Clerk to allow for the orderly proceeding of selecting a candidate, while respecting the standard agenda of a regular Council meeting if applicable.

Copies of all application documents will be included with the agenda package for the meeting and will be made available as part of the public agenda.

### **At the scheduled meeting, the following shall take place:**

- a) The Chair will make a short statement regarding the purpose of the meeting and the general order of proceedings to be followed.
- b) The Clerk will provide to the Chair a list of names of those individuals who have indicated, in writing, their interest in being appointed to the vacancy and the Chair will call for a motion from Council in the following form:

"That the following individuals, who have signified in writing that they are legally qualified to hold office and consented to accept the office if they are appointed

to fill the vacancy be considered for appointment to fill such vacancy”.

- c) Council shall review the list of candidates and their statements of qualifications.
- d) The Candidates shall be sequestered. Each Candidate’s name will be placed in a container and drawn by the Clerk to determine the order of speaking.
- e) Each of the candidates shall be afforded the opportunity to address Council for a period of not more than ten (10) minutes. Once a candidate has completed speaking, each Council member may ask a maximum of two (2) questions per candidate. No scoring system shall be used in considering the answers to the questions. It is not necessary for any candidate to participate in answering any or all of the questions if they choose not to.

Candidates will take their seat in Council Chambers once they have finished speaking. When all Candidates have spoken and returned to the Council Chambers, Council will proceed to vote.

Upon reviewing the candidates and statements of qualification, Council will proceed to vote as follows:

- i) Council will vote by way of public vote, and all candidates will be invited to witness the voting and the remainder of the meeting. Members of Council shall verbally cast their vote.
- ii) Candidate names shall be displayed in alphabetical order for Council and the public to view on a screen within the Council Chamber.
- iii) Members of Council shall vote for one candidate only.
- iv) The Clerk shall call upon the member of Council to verbally cast vote in random order drawn by lot.
- v) The Clerk or designate shall tabulate the results.

### **RESULTS**

- a) The Candidate receiving more than ½ (one half) of the votes shall be declared successful.

*b) Tie – if the votes cast are equal between 2 (two) candidates:*

1. All other Candidates will be removed from voting.
2. The Clerk will ask Council to vote again.
3. If the results remain the same, the Clerk shall place both Candidates name into a container. The FIRST NAME DRAWN will be declared the successful Candidate.

*c) 2-1-1 Vote – if the votes cast are 2 (two) for Candidate X; 1 (one) for Candidate Y and 1 (one) for Candidate Z:*

1. All Candidates receiving zero votes will be removed from voting.
2. The Clerk will ask Council to vote again.
3. If the results remain the same, the Clerk shall place the names of each Candidate with 1 (one) vote into a container. The FIRST NAME DRAWN will be retained, the name remaining in the container will be removed from voting.
4. The Clerk will ask Council to vote again, between the 2 (two) Candidates. If the vote is a tie, the Clerk will ask for the vote a second time. If the vote remains a tie, the names will be placed in a container. The FIRST NAME DRAWN will be declared the successful Candidate.

*d) 1-1-1-1 Vote – if the votes cast are for 4 (four) individual Candidates:*

1. All Candidates receiving zero votes will be removed from voting.
2. The Clerk will ask Council to vote again.
3. If the results remain the same, the Clerk shall place the names of each Candidate with 1 (one) vote into a container. The FIRST NAME DRAWN will be ELIMINATED from the vote.
4. The Clerk will ask Council to vote between the 3 (three) remaining Candidates. The Vote will then follow any of the steps above a-c, to determine the successful Candidate.

A By-law confirming the appointment of the successful candidate shall be enacted by Council immediately after the conclusion of the voting, and the new member shall take their Declaration of Office before taking their seat on Council.

### **General Voting Rules**

Each piece of paper used by the Clerk to draw names of candidates (by lot) in accordance with the requirements of this Procedure will be created by the Clerk and will be equal in size and type and will contain the name of one member only, last name appearing first followed by first name.

Only the Clerk or their delegate may handle the pieces of paper or the container referenced in this procedure.

The minutes of the Council meeting shall include a full disclosure of all voting results.

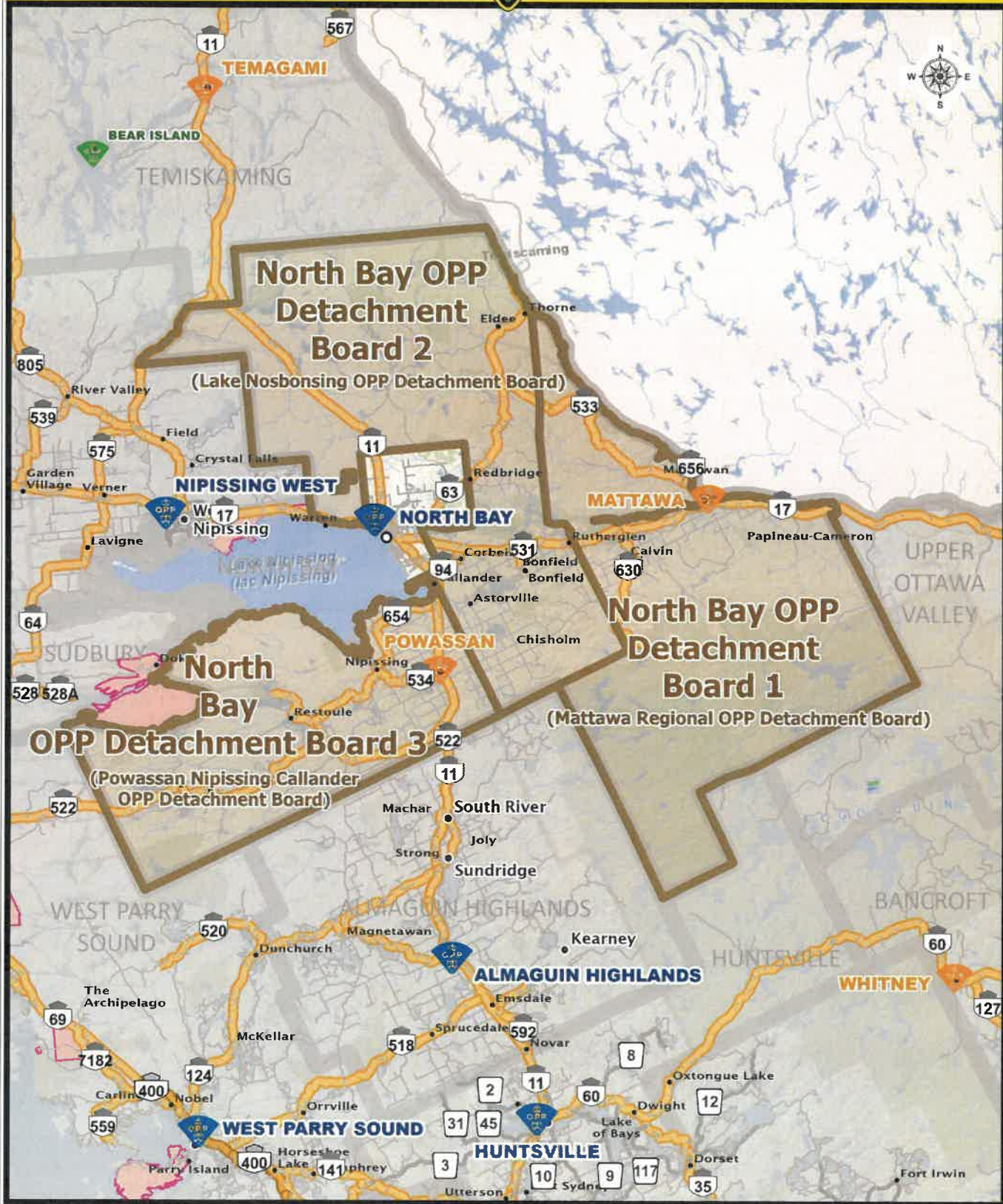

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# Message from the Detachment Commander

I am pleased to present the North Bay Detachment – 2025 OPP Detachment Board Annual Report. This report outlines crime trends, traffic enforcement activity, and community well-being initiatives, and highlights the continued efforts of our members to deliver professional, effective, and community-focused policing services.



The year 2025 marked the final year of the 2023–2025 North Bay Detachment Action Plan. This report provides a comprehensive overview of the progress made against our commitments and reflects the collective efforts of our members, our policing partners, and the communities we serve.

I am extremely proud of the work undertaken by our detachment over the past year.

In 2025, the North Bay Detachment experienced a reduction in overall violent crime, decreasing from 238 occurrences in 2024 to 204 in 2025. This reduction reflects the continued focus of our members on proactive enforcement, offender management, and strong investigative practices. While serious incidents, including a homicide, were investigated during the year, our members responded with professionalism and diligence, ensuring accountability and support for victims and their families.

Property crime also saw a notable decrease, dropping from 334 occurrences in 2024 to 286 in 2025. This reduction is attributed to targeted enforcement initiatives, enhanced offender management strategies, and continued collaboration with policing partners and community stakeholders. Fraud remains a persistent and evolving challenge; however, through continued education, awareness initiatives, and investigative support, we are working to mitigate its impact on our communities.

Traffic safety remained a key priority. Our members maintained a strong focus on the OPP’s “Big Four” causal factors: impaired driving, distracted driving, aggressive driving, and seatbelt compliance. These efforts contributed to a continued reduction in fatal collisions compared to previous years, while enforcement and education initiatives helped address ongoing risky driving behaviours. Targeted operations, joint enforcement initiatives, and community-driven traffic complaints continued to shape our approach to keeping our roadways, waterways, and trails safe.

Throughout the year, we continued to respond to community concerns through increased visibility, targeted patrols, and locally driven enforcement initiatives. These efforts not only addressed specific issues but also reinforced public confidence and trust in policing services.

We continued to leverage modern technology, including in-car camera systems, automated licence plate recognition (ALPR), mobile workstations, and body-worn cameras (BWC) to enhance investigative capabilities, improve transparency, and support officer and public safety.

Collaboration remains a cornerstone of our success. In 2025, we continued to work closely with our policing partners, including the North Bay Police Service, Anishinabek Police Service, Nipissing First

Nation Police, and Military Police, on joint enforcement initiatives, intelligence sharing, and coordinated responses to cross-jurisdictional issues.

Our commitment to community well-being remains strong. Through our Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) and partnerships with the Canadian Mental Health Association and other community agencies, we continue to support individuals experiencing mental health and addiction-related challenges. The formalization of the Police-Hospital Transition Protocol in 2025 represents a significant milestone in improving outcomes for individuals in crisis and strengthening collaboration between emergency services and healthcare partners.

Community engagement continues to be a priority. Our members remained actively involved in local events, initiatives, and outreach opportunities across the detachment area. These engagements are critical to building relationships, enhancing trust, and ensuring our policing efforts remain aligned with community needs and expectations.

Equally important is our commitment to our members. Throughout 2025, we continued to invest in training, mentorship, and leadership development opportunities, ensuring our members are well-equipped to meet the evolving demands of policing while maintaining a strong focus on wellness and professional growth.

In 2026, we will release the new 2026–2029 North Bay Detachment Action Plan, the first developed under the *Community Safety and Policing Act* (CSPA). This plan has been developed in close collaboration with the Lake Nosbonsing, Mattawa Regional, and Powassan Nipissing Callander OPP Detachment Boards, as well as through meaningful engagement with the communities we serve.

The development of this plan aligns with the 2026–2029 OPP Strategic Plan, ensuring a coordinated and unified approach to community safety and policing priorities.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to continuous improvement, strong partnerships, and delivering policing services that reflect the needs and expectations of our communities.

Our members continue to serve with Pride, Professionalism and Honour, Respect, Compassion and Fairness, Integrity, Honesty and Courage. I am proud of their dedication and the work they do each and every day.

The detachment continued to deliver locally driven traffic initiatives in response to community concerns and emerging trends. These initiatives included targeted enforcement in high-risk areas, commercial motor vehicle inspections along key corridors, and joint operations with partner agencies to enhance road safety.

Collaboration remained a key component of success. The North Bay Detachment worked alongside the North Bay Police Service and other partners on joint enforcement initiatives, combining resources and intelligence to increase visibility and maximize impact.

In addition to roadway enforcement, the detachment remained committed to safety on waterways and trails through the continued efforts of the Community Directed Enforcement Officer (CDEO) program, which provides oversight and coordination of enforcement initiatives across these areas.

Through the CDEO program:

- The Marine Unit conducted proactive patrols, vessel checks, and enforcement activities, contributing to the safe and responsible use of local waterways
- The Motorized Snow Vehicle (MSV) program maintained a strong patrol presence on trail systems, supported by trained members and partnerships with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry
- Seasonal enforcement initiatives were coordinated to address emerging risks, including unsafe operation, impaired use, and non-compliance with legislation on both waterways and trails

This coordinated approach ensures that enforcement efforts are strategic, intelligence-led, and aligned with community concerns, while maximizing the effective use of specialized resources across the detachment.

Public education and community engagement remained integral to these efforts. Members continued to engage with the public through both in-person interactions and digital platforms, reinforcing key safety messages and promoting responsible behaviour across all modes of transportation.

Through a balanced approach of enforcement, education, and community engagement, the North Bay Detachment continues to

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## Other Community Updates

In 2025, the North Bay Detachment continued to build on its commitment to community safety and well-being through proactive engagement, targeted prevention initiatives, and strong partnerships with community stakeholders.

The past year reflects meaningful progress across a number of areas. At the same time, it has reinforced that the work we are doing alongside our partners and communities is only the beginning. The challenges facing our communities continue to evolve, and so must our approach. What we have established in 2025 provides a strong foundation to build on moving forward.

### Major Incident Response – Samuel de Champlain Provincial Park

On June 21, 2025, a severe weather event in Samuel de Champlain Provincial Park resulted in one of the most significant natural disasters experienced within the detachment area in recent years.

What began as a typical summer storm quickly escalated into a violent downburst, with winds exceeding 100 km/h. The storm caused widespread devastation throughout the park—flattening large sections of forest, crushing vehicles and trailers, and leaving hundreds of campers trapped in hazardous and rapidly deteriorating conditions.

The scale of the incident was immediate and significant. Approximately 351 campers were impacted, generating 77 calls for service, representing a substantial and sudden increase in demand. Many of these calls involved individuals trapped or injured as a result of falling trees and debris.

Members of the North Bay, Mattawa and Powassan Detachments, alongside fire services, park staff, and emergency partners, responded without hesitation.

Officers worked in extremely challenging and dangerous conditions, navigating heavily damaged terrain where road access was limited or completely obstructed. Using available equipment, including chainsaws, members moved through debris fields to reach stranded individuals, provide medical assistance, and facilitate evacuations.

Rescue efforts continued throughout the night and into the following day. In coordination with aviation resources, multiple individuals were safely extracted from otherwise inaccessible areas and transported to safety. Displaced campers were received and supported within the Mattawa community, where emergency reception centres were established.

Accounts from those involved described the event as “the longest night of their lives,” highlighting both the severity of the situation and the importance of the coordinated emergency response.

Despite the scale of destruction and the inherent risks, there were no fatalities. This outcome is a direct reflection of the professionalism, courage, and commitment demonstrated by all responding personnel.

Members responded both on and off duty, placing themselves in harm’s way to assist others. They demonstrated leadership, adaptability, and resilience in an environment that was dynamic, unpredictable, and emotionally demanding.

Incidents of this nature have a lasting impact, not only on the community but also on the members who respond. The physical and psychological demands associated with operating in such conditions are significant, and the well-being of our members remains a priority following events of this magnitude.

This response reflects the very best of policing. When our communities needed help the most, our members answered without hesitation, demonstrating Pride, Professionalism and Honour, Respect, Compassion and Fairness, Integrity, Honesty and Courage in the face of extraordinary circumstances.

### Crime Prevention and Community Engagement

Based on emerging crime trends and community feedback, the detachment led several crime prevention and education initiatives, with a particular focus on fraud awareness and community safety.

In collaboration with the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre and local detachment boards, members delivered fraud prevention presentations in communities such as Powassan and East Ferris. These sessions were designed not only to educate, but to empower residents, particularly those most vulnerable, to recognize and prevent fraud before it occurs.

In 2025, we also expanded our use of digital communication platforms, including Facebook and Instagram, to deliver timely and locally relevant public safety messaging. Through short, locally produced video content, we were able to connect directly with our communities on issues such as road safety, fraud, and community well-being.

This approach represents a shift toward more accessible, transparent, and proactive communication, allowing us to extend our reach well beyond traditional methods. The success we have seen in this space will continue to grow as we further develop this strategy.

### Community Patrol and Proactive Policing

The North Bay Detachment continued to prioritize community-based, intelligence-led patrols, ensuring that our presence is not only visible but purposeful.

Through community feedback, data analysis, and officer-driven initiatives, members focused their efforts on areas of concern, including traffic-related issues, property crime trends, and locations involving vulnerable populations.

This targeted approach has allowed us to be more effective in both enforcement and engagement. It has also reinforced the importance of being present in our communities, not only in response to incidents, but as part of a deliberate strategy to prevent them.

Our goal is not simply to respond to calls for service, but to influence outcomes, reduce risk, and build trust. The progress made in 2025 demonstrates that we are moving in the right direction, while recognizing there is still more to be done.

## [Youth and Community Engagement](#)

Engagement with youth and families remained a priority throughout 2025.

Members participated in school visits, community events, and local initiatives aimed at building positive relationships and promoting safety. These interactions are critical, not only in educating youth but in shaping long-term perceptions of policing and strengthening trust within our communities.

We continue to see the value of these engagements, both in the relationships that are built and in the opportunities they create to guide, support, and connect with the next generation.

## [Indigenous and Community Partnerships](#)

Building and strengthening relationships with Indigenous communities and diverse populations remains a priority for the North Bay Detachment.

In 2025, members continued to engage with Indigenous communities and participate in cultural events and initiatives across the region. These interactions are an important part of our ongoing commitment to reconciliation, understanding, and meaningful partnership.

We recognize that strong relationships are built over time through consistency, respect, and presence. The progress made in 2025 reflects continued efforts in this area, while reinforcing the importance of ongoing engagement moving forward.

## [Mental Health and Vulnerable Persons](#)

The increasing demand for mental health-related support continues to present challenges for both policing and community partners.

Through ongoing collaboration with community-based agencies and the continued development of initiatives such as the MCRT, the North Bay Detachment has taken a coordinated and compassionate approach to supporting individuals in crisis.

These efforts have improved our ability to connect individuals with the appropriate resources, reduce repeat interactions, and ensure that responses are aligned with the needs of the individual.

While progress has been made, we recognize that this remains a complex and evolving area. Continued collaboration, innovation, and shared responsibility will be essential as we move forward.

## [Innovative and Community-Focused Initiatives](#)

In 2025, the North Bay Detachment continued to implement innovative, problem-solving approaches to address ongoing community safety concerns.

The Safer Streets – Generosity Redirection Initiative is one example of this approach. Rather than relying solely on enforcement, this initiative focused on education, awareness, and collaboration with community partners to address the risks associated with roadside solicitation.

This reflects a broader shift toward long-term, sustainable solutions—addressing not only the symptoms of an issue, but the underlying factors contributing to it.

These types of initiatives demonstrate what can be achieved when we take a collaborative, forward-thinking approach to community safety.

### [Member Development and Leadership](#)

Our members remain our greatest asset, and their development continues to be a priority.

In 2025, we continued to invest in training, mentorship, and leadership development opportunities, ensuring our members are well-equipped to meet the demands of modern policing.

A key component of this approach has been the continued use of recruit-led initiatives, where new officers are tasked with identifying community concerns, developing targeted responses, and presenting outcomes to leadership.

This not only builds accountability and confidence but also reinforces a culture of innovation, ownership, and community-focused policing from the outset of a member's career.

The growth we are seeing within our members directly contributes to the success of the detachment as a whole.

### [Closing Perspective](#)

The progress made throughout 2025 is a direct reflection of the dedication of our members, the strength of our partnerships, and the trust of the communities we serve.

While we have achieved meaningful success, we recognize that community safety is not static. The work we have undertaken this past year has positioned us well, but it also sets the stage for continued growth, improvement, and innovation.

We remain committed to building on this momentum as we move into the next phase of our action plan for 2026-2029.

# Policing Hours

The OPP has developed a Service Delivery Model (SDM) in response to several reviews and audit recommendations. The SDM is designed to:

- Promote officer wellness through balanced workloads
- Determine adequate staffing levels at each detachment
- Ensure the continued delivery of adequate and effective policing services in accordance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*

To support SDM implementation, the OPP is undertaking a multi-year staffing strategy to address required increases in detachment personnel. This model supports the OPP’s ability to:

- Respond effectively to increasing calls for service
- Maintain safe communities through proactive patrols and community engagement
- Meet municipal expectations for police visibility

To monitor progress and guide detachment-level planning, the OPP has established time allocation targets for provincial constables (Figure 1). These targets reflect how time should ideally be distributed by the end of the SDM staffing strategy.

The targets are based on a provincial average, and variations are expected between detachments due to differences in geography, operational structure, recruitment and leave of absence rates.

Detachments may face challenges in achieving these targets, but progress is expected as scheduling, data quality and strategic deployment continue to improve.

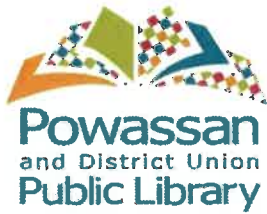

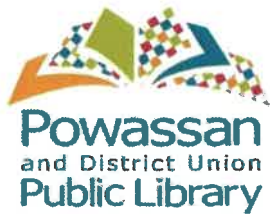
Our submitted budget has now been approved by all three municipalities; I have therefore included an updated invoice for 2026.

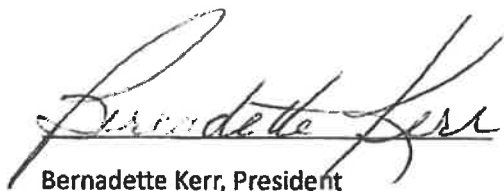
